Serving as the director of the Maternal and Child Health Bureau-funded Leadership Education in Adolescent Health Training Program and the ACGME-approved Adolescent Medicine Fellowship Program, I develop, coordinate, and oversee didactic, clinical, and research training opportunities for adolescent medicine fellows, psychology post-doctoral fellows, and graduate students in nutrition, nursing, and social work.
